Yr. 11 Requirements

- Pass in English and Maths
- Commitment to:
 - regular attendance,
 - satisfactory behaviour and effort
- Satisfactory Submission of all assessment for all subjects

What happens at the end of Year 10 if my child isn't meeting literacy or numeracy requirements?

- If students are unsuccessful in Maths and/or English in Semester 1:
 - Semester 2 make a plan to achieve pre-requisite by end of Semester 2
 - Complete Summer School (Week 9 and 10 of Term
 4) and re-submit any required tasks to work towards a pass standard.
- Students will be ineligible to study General Maths/English (ATAR pathway) in Year 11/12.

Subject Pre-requisites

Goal – every student has the opportunity to achieve a QCE when they complete year 12.

- Apply to some year 11/12 subjects
- Ensure students select subjects in which they have the greatest capacity to be successful.
- The new QCE requires students are successful in each unit of each subject they study
- There is an application and interview process for students who do not meet pre-requisites.

What happens at the end of Year 10 if my child isn't meeting subject requirements?

- Students may have to revisit their subject selections to change to subjects that do not have pre-requisites
- Make an application to the Principal to study a subject if prerequisites haven't been met

Requirements for a QCE



Set amount 20 credits from contributing courses of study, including:

- QCAA-developed subjects or courses
- vocational education and training (VET) qualifications
- · non-Queensland studies
- recognised studies.

Set standard Satisfactory completion, grade of C or better, competency or qualification completion, pass or equivalent.

Set pattern 12 credits from completed Core courses of study and 8 credits from any combination of:

- Core
- Preparatory (maximum 4)
- Complementary (maximum 8).

Students must meet literacy and numeracy requirements through one of the available learning options.





Alternative pathways to tertiary

Certificate III completion:

Pathway options vary depending on institution, program, and prerequisites.

Diploma completion:

Completion of Year 12 or Year 12 leaving age. On completion apply for courses through QTAC. No ATAR required. Same, or similar timeframe of completion.

Enabling Programs:

- * University of Sunshine Coast Tertiary Preparation Pathway = 4 skills specific courses over a minimum of 1 semester. On completion of TPP entry is gained into most USC programs through direct application. No ATAR required.
- * University of Queensland College Tertiary Preparation Program = 28 week program. On completion of TPP apply for courses through QTAC. No ATAR required.

Bridging Programs:

Students who have not met a prerequisite may be able to complete a course prior to being accepted into an undergraduate course. Each institution sets their own bridging courses and rules around those bridging courses.

TAFE at Schools Program



Year 11 and 12 students are able to complete a TAFE Queensland Certificate I, II or III qualification while still at school.

Costs vary depending on the course, however, generally the tuition fees are significantly reduced, or there is no tuition fee attached to the course.

TAFE Queensland term dates align with Queensland school terms to fit with your senior studies.




What is a SET Plan?
